I am writing to give you advance notice of the above seminar. Please note there is a charge for most delegates, although concessionary and complimentary places are available (subject to terms and conditions - see below).

This timely seminar will assess policy priorities and key implementation issues for rebalancing the economy and strengthening regions across the UK, focusing on:

- Developing the necessary infrastructure, including issues around connectivity, collaboration and finance; and
- Attracting businesses and investment, and meeting skills needs.

I thought the subject matter would be of particular interest to you as delegates are expected to discuss **the role of transport** in delivering economic growth.

The agenda includes keynote contributions from **Tom Walker**, Director, Cities & Local Growth Unit and **Jessica Bowles**, Head of Policy, Partnerships and Research, Growth and Neighbourhoods Directorate, Manchester City Council.

Delegates will discuss the impact of new measures announced in the Chancellor's Autumn Statement, including the £400 million Northern Powerhouse investment fund which has been created to help small businesses to grow, and the latest developments on the work that Transport for the North and the Department for Transport are doing on the <u>northern transport strategy</u>.

Further sessions will look at wider issues in the context of the <u>Cities and Local Government Devolution</u> <u>Bill</u>, including the policy landscape for devolution and the role of elected mayors, and how to encourage science-based and innovative companies to relocate to different regions across the country.





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Overall, areas for discussion include:

- Priorities for developing infrastructure and regional connectivity;
- Opportunities and challenges for LEPs and mayoralties in the regionally devolved context;
- The impact of the Cities and Local Government Devolution Bill;
- Science, innovation and regional growth;
- Key issues for meeting skills development needs; and
- Next steps for devolution and financing.

The draft agenda is copied below my signature, and a regularly updated version is available to download <u>here</u>. The seminar is organised on the basis of strict impartiality by the Westminster Social Policy Forum.
